in this long term community study of the freedom movement in rural majority black claiborne county mississippi emilye crosby explores the impact of the african american freedom struggle on small communities in general and questions common assumptions that are based on the national movement the legal successes at the national level in the mid 1960s did not end the movement crosby contends but rather emboldened people across the south to initiate waves of new actions around local issues escalating assertiveness and demands of african americans including the reality of armed self defense were critical to ensuring meaningful local change to a remarkably resilient system of white supremacy in claiborne county a highly effective boycott eventually led the supreme court to affirm the legality of economic boycotts for political protest naacp leader charles evers brother of medgar managed to earn seemingly contradictory support from the national naacp the segregationist sovereignty commission and white liberals studying both black activists and the white opposition crosby employs traditional sources and more than 100 oral histories to analyze the political and economic issues in the postmovement period the impact of the movement and the resilience of white supremacy and the ways these issues are closely connected to competing histories of the community

lifting the chains is a history of the black experience in america since the civil war told by one of our most distinguished historians of modern america william h chafe chafe highlights the role of all black institutions especially the churches lodges local gangs neighborhood women s groups and the black college clubs that gathered at local pool halls that talked up the issues examined different courses of action and then put their lives on the line to make change happen drawing on the tremendous oral history archives at duke that chafe founded and nurtured the book includes unpublished oral histories of black activism

freedom campaign that aimed to complement voter registration work in mississippi by providing everyday sustenance to african americans addressing more recent issues this volume considers the politics of public memory in baltimore maryland a city divided by racial riots in 1968 and in 2015 it then examines the black lives matter movement that gained international attention for its response to michael brown s death at the hands of police in ferguson missouri as well as the sandra bland movement inspired by the arrest of bland and her subsequent death in the waller county jail in rural texas these chapters connect the activism of today shaped in so many ways by social media student activism and grassroots organization to a deeply historical wide ranging fight for equality

in many histories of boston african americans have remained almost invisible partly as a result when the 1972 crisis over school desegregation and busing erupted many observers professed shock at the overt racism on display in the cradle of liberty yet the city has long been divided over matters of race and it was also home to a far older black organizing tradition than many realize a community of black activists had fought

segregated education since the origins of public schooling and racial inequality since the end of northern slavery before busing tells the story of the men and women who struggled and demonstrated to make school desegregation a reality in boston it reveals the legal efforts and battles over tactics that played out locally and influenced the national black freedom struggle and the book gives credit to the black organizers parents and children who fought long and hard battles for justice that have been left out of the standard narratives of the civil rights movement what emerges is a clear picture of the long and hard fought campaigns to break the back of jim crow education in the north and make boston into a better more democratic city a fight that continues to this day

in this innovative study crystal sanders explores how working class black women in collaboration with the federal government created the child development group of mississippi cdgm in 1965 a head start program that not only gave poor black children access to early childhood education but also provided black women with greater opportunities for political activism during a crucial time in the unfolding of the civil rights movement women who had previously worked as domestics and sharecroppers secured jobs through cdgm as teachers and support staff and earned higher wages the availability of jobs independent of the local white power structure afforded these women the freedom to vote in elections and petition officials without fear of reprisal but cdgm s success antagonized segregationists at both the local and state levels who eventually defunded it tracing the stories of the more than 2 500 women who staffed mississippi s cdgm preschool centers sanders s book remembers women who went beyond teaching children their shapes and colors to challenge the state s closed political system and white supremacist ideology and offers a profound example for future community organizing in the south

in the early 1960s thousands of black activists used nonviolent direct action to challenge segregation at lunch counters movie theaters skating rinks public pools and churches across the united states battling for and winning social change organizers against segregation had used litigation and protests for decades but not until the advent of nonviolence did they succeed in transforming ingrained patterns of white supremacy on a massive scale in this book anthony c siracusa unearths the deeper lineage of anti war pacifist activists and thinkers from the early twentieth century who developed nonviolence into a revolutionary force for black liberation telling the story of how this powerful political

philosophy came to occupy a central place in the black freedom movement by 1960 siracusa challenges the idea that nonviolent freedom practices faded with the rise of the black power movement he asserts nonviolence s staying power insisting that the indwelling commitment to struggle for freedom collectively in a spirit of nonviolence became for many a lifelong commitment in the end what was revolutionary about the nonviolent method was its ability to assert the basic humanity of black americans to undermine racism s dehumanization and to insist on the right to be

white civic elites scrambled to secure the city s burgeoning reputation as the gateway to the americas an influx of spanish speaking migrants and tourists had a transformative effect on conventional notions of blackness business owners and city boosters resisted arbitrary racial distinctions and even permitted dark skinned latinos access to public accommodations that were otherwise off limits to nonwhites in the south at the same time civil rights activists waged a fierce battle against the antiblack discrimination and violence that lay beneath the public image of miami as a place relatively tolerant of racial diversity in its exploration of regional distinctions transnational forces and the effect of both on the civil rights battle the struggle for black freedom in miami complicates the black white binary and offers a new way of understanding the complexity of racial traditions and white supremacy in southern metropolises like miami
